The Pledge of Allegiance


I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

The Gettysburg Address

Delivered by President Abraham Lincoln on November 19, 1863, At the dedication of the Cemetery at Gettysburg

Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate... we can not consecrate... we can not hallow... this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced.

It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us -- that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to the cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion -- that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain -- that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom -- and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

How to Memorize State Capitals Quickly

There aren't any magic shortcuts to memorization, but there are several ways to make memorizing state capitals painless or even fun.

Step 1

First, spend time <u>looking at a map</u> that has just the capitals marked, for example, the map here: http://www.50states.com/cap.htm If you have a few days to memorize state capitals, print out the map and put it somewhere like in front of your desk or by your bed. If you have less time, just study it for several minutes.

Step 2

Then, <u>listen several times to the state capitals song</u>. Try this version http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=sNUDDaEOvuY or try http://www.songsforteaching.com/recall/50statescapitals.htm or this one http://www.mrsjonesroom.com/songs/50capitals.htm Annoying? Yes. But it will be stuck in your head for days, which is what we want.

Step 3

Next, take a quiz on the state capitals. There are lots of quizzes available online, Here are some quiz websites to try:

Another way to do it is to simply print up a blank US map and fill in each state with its capital. Or print up a list of the states and fill in the blanks

Step 4

Take the quiz several times in a row. You may want to make it into a game by timing yourself or giving yourself treats as you memorize state capitals. Try challenging your parents or someone else who thinks they already know the state capitals and see if you can do better than them.

If you can sing back the state capitals song from memory, or if you can consistently get almost all of the capitals right on your quiz, you're done!
